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Principal's Report

I am so pleased to have this opportunity to thank you all for the warm welcome I have had in coming into the school. It has been wonderful meeting the students and starting to meet some of the parents and caregivers.

The start of term saw the launch of our Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) program. This researchbased approach works to improve student outcomes by making sure that students get an appropriate level of support. It involves having a consistent approach to positive behaviour expectations and developing a common language and understanding of positive behaviour. As someone who is new to the school, it has been exciting to see staff and students embrace this approach. We are also appreciative of the positive feedback that we have received from a number of parents and caregivers.

As you are likely aware, Eastern Hills was granted \$1.5 million for a new STEM facility following the last state election. We are in the process of working with the architects to design the space, with the hope that the build will commence before the end of the school year. Our focus is on developing a space which encourages collaboration and supports students in developing 21st century skills.

It has been a busy term with the school and interschool swimming carnivals, NAPLAN and OLNA, and the band camp, to name a few. Student engagement has been outstanding with many of our students demonstrating our PBS value of **growth** by having a go, even when they find it challenging and outside of their comfort zone.

Finally, we have had the first P&C meeting of the 2024 school year. The work that this group does adds real value to Eastern Hills. Parent, caregiver, and community support are critical to the life of the school and to achieving the best possible outcomes for our students. The P&C meets once per term for approximately an hour each meeting. You are welcome to join us at our Term 2 meeting; details will be available on our social media in advance of the date.

NAPLAN



NAPLAN 2024

Thank you to all the Year 7 and Year 9 students who participated in NAPLAN this term. Student behaviour and participation was excellent. Well done to all students involved.

NAPLAN Reports will be issued to the school later in the year in order to be distributed to students/parents. Further information regarding this will be circulated at a later date.

A record 992 positive behaviour entries were added for students as a result of their exemplary behaviour during NAPLAN, well done!

School of Isolated and Distance Education (SIDE)

There are several students in Years 11 and 12 at the school who are enrolled in distance education courses through the School of Isolated and Distance Education (SIDE) due to being unable to access desired courses owing to timetable constraints at the school.

SIDE delivers a high standard education using digital technologies to deliver online education programs. This occurs in two forms:

- **Synchronous,** real-time communication through the **Webex** web-conferencing platform. Students are timetabled for two Webex lessons per week for most subjects providing them with access to scheduled live instruction.
- Asynchronous, using Moodle to deliver learning and staff and student collaboration. Moodle provides 24/7 access with students completing work independently under the direction and guidance of their teachers. As with any enrolment in an upper school course students are provided with a course outline, an assessment plan an Assessment and Reporting Policy that complies with the requirements of the School Curriculum and Standards Authority. So students are well aware of what they need to know and how they will be assessed. SIDE teachers are in regular communication with schools and students. The school provides access to a quiet and well-equipped learning environment which supports the Webex and Moodle requirements. A dedicated SIDE supervisor (Deputy Principal) and a point of contact in the library manage timetable requirements and assist students with their day-to-day studies.

Students need to understand that while SIDE happens at the school the enrolment in SIDE courses is the responsibility of the School of Isolated and Distance Education not the school. Students have been provided with an *Assessment and Reporting Policy* through SIDE which they must observe regarding completion and submission of assessments. Incursions, excursions and school camps which impinge on their attendance at school must be communicated to their SIDE teachers and appropriate adjustments agreed to for any absences from participation in Webex lessons or for their inability to meet assessment deadlines. Any absences from school that affect SIDE deadlines must be communicated to SIDE through the Deputy Principal. Please read the assessment and reporting policy to understand what is required for the successful completion of SIDE courses.



School Dress Code



I would like to sincerely acknowledge those parents and students who consistently meet the dress requirements of the school which enhances the profile of the school within the community. The dress code sets a positive standard for the school. It supports all students to participate fully in school life and helps to create a sense of identity amongst them and a school culture in which every student experiences a sense of belonging. The school dress code intends to keep costs of clothing within reasonable limits for parents.

Outdoor Education

Omeo Wreck Snorkelling Excursions

As part of our Outdoor Education program a number of Year 10 and 12 Outdoor Education classes have participated in excursions to the Coogee Maritime Trail to snorkel on the Omeo Wreck and surrounding snorkelling trail. The Omeo was a iron steamship built in 1858 that was used to lay the Bass Straight Telegraph cable and the Overland Telegraph linking Australia to Britain via Singapore. The Omeo was driven ashore and wrecked in 1905. This was an excellent opportunity for students to demonstrate their snorkelling skills learnt in class using the Mt Helena pool in a quality marine environment.





Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) - Care, Pride and Growth

It has been an exciting start to the 2024 school year with the introduction of PBS to the school community. Students have participated in a range of PBS lessons based on the positive behaviour expectations of Care, Pride and Growth which are outlined in our PBS matrix.

Parents/ Care givers can use the Compass App to monitor how many positive points have been collected. Students accumulate positive points which make them eligible to win prizes. Geography Excursion

In Term 1, the Year 11 Geography class conducted a field trip to Meckering/Cunderdin to investigate the cause and effects of the 1968 Meckering Earthquake. They heard firsthand accounts of the day and the months and years after the quake. They also experienced the Earthquake through the simulator "The Quake House" that is inside the Cunderdin Museum. They got to see some of the effects from the earthquake through visiting the "Snook House Ruins", the Memorial Rose Garden

where damaged pieces of the rail and pipeline have been preserved, they visited a section of the Faultline that has been left by the owners of the farm which showed how the land was uplifted.







THE EARTH SHOOK

The town of Meckering was devastated by an earthquake with a force of 6.9 on the Richter scale at 10.59 am on Monday 14 October 1968. It was the most severe earthquake recorded in Australia to that time. In the space of 40 seconds virtually the whole town was destroyed. More than 40 tremors were felt, some up to 5 on the Richter scale, in the 24 hours that followed the main quake.


The quake's epicentre was 9 km south west of the town. It left a fault line 32 km long. In some areas the ground was pushed up 1.5 m. In others a deep crack in the earth opened up - deep enough for a man to stand in. All of Western Australia's earthquakes have occurred in a zone of geological weakness 65 km wide from Moora to Nongerup.
